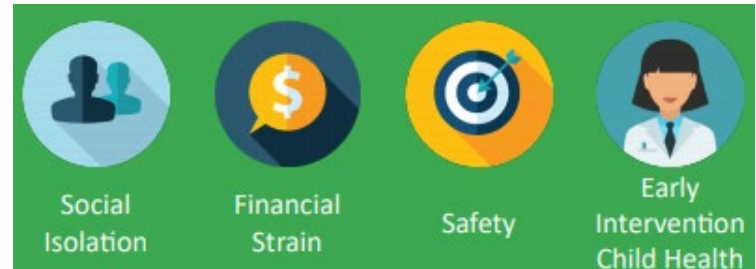

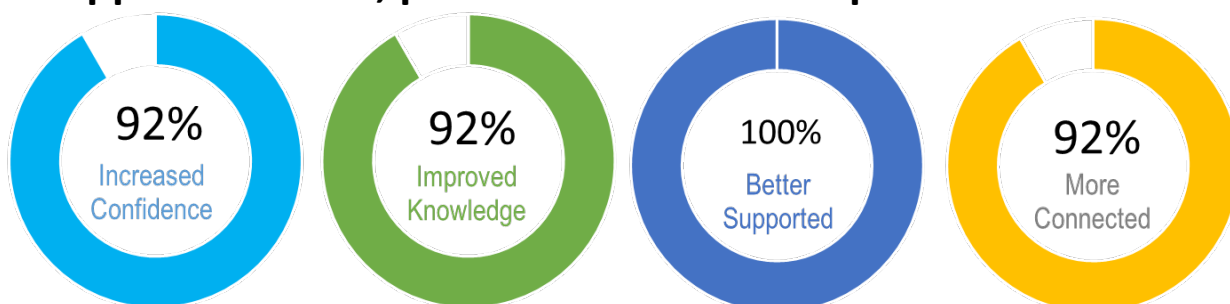
179 families	Receiving education & support delivered through 40 COURSES with combined duration of 120 hours.

The Me at 2 Passport is designed as a simple tool to improve parents' knowledge around child development, increase social connection and provide support for families and young children. The launch event – The Yellow Brick Road - where children navigated a pathway of different developmental activities from the Me at 2 Passport, was held at Goodstart Early Learning in February. This event allowed parents and early learning educators to chat about childhood development at 2 years of age.

92% of parents reported they gained knowledge of their child's development.

LEARNING THROUGH PLAY



Participating in structured and unstructured play activities allows children to develop social skills through playing, sharing and learning together. Meerilinga Cockburn Children and Family Centre provides a safe environment for families to come together. Meerilinga hosts supported playgroups during school holidays and on a term-basis. Willagee Community Playtime is held at the Caralee Community School and supported by volunteers from Meerilinga.
