

Working in and with the Kwinana community the Connecting Community for Kids collective impact initiative is focused on 4 community identified priorities.

Receiving education & support 80 delivered through families 14 COURSES with combined duration of **56** hours. 827 19 regular ACTIVITIES & families **GROUPS** to join offering a combined **140** hours of engagement. 198 21 SHORT WORKSHOPS totalling families **40** hours of information to parents and children. 84 Receiving 296 hours 1: 1 SUPPORT. families **126** families Attending **6** one-off events. 101 **4** workshops helping service participants providers respond to community needs.

EMPOWERING PARENTS

Joanne's story

My journey started about a year and half ago through Community Mothers Program. Then I found out KEYS were doing peer facilitator courses.

It has changed me from a mum who didn't think I was going anywhere, to a peer facilitator with aspirations and desire to achieve. This journey has hugely grown my self-confidence, my abilities and drive to want something more and something better.

Empowering Parents Empowering Communities (EPEC) is a peer-to-peer program supporting parents to build strong relationships and family support.

The program has two components. Parents in the community take part in a facilitator training course to deliver the 'Being a Parent' (BAP) course. Then pairs of trained parent facilitators deliver the 9 week Being a Parent course to local parents.

Stemming from existing capacity building of volunteer community mothers from Connecting Community for Kids there was an opportunity for Community Mothers to become trained parent facilitator and gain employment through EPEC.
