



AS A RESULT OF THE SUPPORT RECEIVED, PARENTS IN KWINANA REPORT:

37 families	Receiving education & support delivered through 4 COURSES with combined duration of 55 hours.
969 families	17 regular ACTIVITIES & GROUPS to join offering a combined 144 hours of engagement.
138 families	13 SHORT WORKSHOPS totalling 25 hours of information to parents and children.
55 families	Receiving 184 hours 1: 1 SUPPORT .
291 families	Attending 11 one-off events.
129 participants	4 workshops helping service providers respond to community needs.

CONNECTING EDUCATORS, TEACHERS AND CHILDREN TRANSITION TO SCHOOL

As a result of working groups of the Early Years Professional Learning Network, a collaborative transition program was trialed at Leda Primary School. The Child and Parent Centre playgroup staff and Leda Primary School staff welcomed 6 children and their educators from Little Rascals for two playgroup sessions at the school at the end of last year. This is the first time in Kwinana that children and staff from an Early Learning and Care Service visited a school to support the children's transition to school and make it a happy and joyful experience. Educators from all three organisations had the opportunity to connect and discuss daily routines and learning experiences at the school and the early learning and care service. Many more families and children will benefit from the trusting relationships built between these educators.



EARS2LEARN

In December we congratulated 9 amazing ladies for reaching competency to provide ear screening for children. Ear Screening, under the Ears2Learn program, is available at Goodstart Early Learning Centres in Cockburn, Success, Bertram and Atwell as well Bright Futures in Kwinana and Babbingur Mia in Rockingham.

Ears2Learn is a partnership between Connecting Community for Kids, Earbus Foundation of WA, Goodstart Early Learning and The Smith Family providing children aged 0 – 5 years ear screening and early detection of ear infections.

The training of para-professionals to provide community ear screening and support parents access health professionals for treatment is a unique approach providing a valued linkage between health and early learning sectors.
