

## \$1.4 million early years investment for Kwinana and Cockburn

- \$1.4 million investment in health and wellbeing of young children living in the cities of Kwinana and Cockburn
- Renewed funding with Woodside Energy for the Connecting Community for Kids collective impact initiative to improve early childhood development outcomes
- Initiative involves collaboration between community members, non-government and government organisations

Young children living in the cities of Kwinana and Cockburn are set to benefit from a \$1.4 million investment designed to improve their health and wellbeing.

Community Services Minister Simone McGurk has welcomed the renewed funding from Woodside Energy for the Connecting Community for Kids collective impact initiative in the cities of Kwinana and Cockburn, with the additional four years in funding bringing the total commitment to nine years.

Woodside has allocated an additional \$1.4 million from the Woodside Development Fund to support the initiative, which is designed to improve early childhood development outcomes.

The project aims to improve the wellbeing and development of children and families. It involves collaboration between community members, non-government and government organisations.

Research shows that we need to focus on the early childhood years to help people to thrive later in life. There is strong evidence that a healthy and positive start to life can strengthen a child and help them to reach their full potential.

The Department of Communities has been involved with the Connecting Community for Kids initiative since its inception, and co-chairs the Joint Advisory Committee model to provide advice and engagement with government and funders in the delivery of the initiative.

The Joint Advisory Committee involves representation from across the community sector and government in an effort to increase collaboration and avoid duplication of services. The announcement coincides with the Kwinana Early Years Service recently agreeing to support the initiative.

The initiative is underpinned by a governance structure that places community members at the heart - they are the voice leading the initiative, and driving the design and implementation of its strategies.
