KWINANA - JULY TO DECEMBER 2020

Australian Early Development Census 2018 results showed 27.2% of 5 year olds in Kwinana were developmentally vulnerable.

We mapped our key areas of work and against community aspiration and aligned these to ARACY's nest, resulting in 6 priority areas that children require to thrive.

KWINANA CASE STUDIES JULY TO DECEMBER 2020

A HOLISTIC TRANSITION TO SCHOOL

As a result of 2.5 years of community consultation the Education, Care and Family Network Kwinana invited the community to celebrate a big milestone. The steering committee comprised of Ngala, CCK, Leda Primary School and Goodstart Parmelia released the My Journey to School booklet and the Off to School Transition Statement, aiming to address the lack of collaboration and shared understanding across the Education and Care and the broader early years sector with regards to transition to school.

80 people from 31 agencies attended the Kwinana event. The booklet received such overwhelmingly positive feedback that the Department of Education provided funding for 5000 more copies and are promoting the work WA wide. The event also prompted The Smith Family and the City of Kwinana to come on board the committee to drive the initiative further.



MULTICULTURAL CLOTHES PARTY

Kwinana's cultural diversity was celebrated in September at our Multicultural Clothes Party. The event was an opportunity to embrace diversity by bringing people from all walks of life together to celebrate the many cultures that make up our vibrant community.

Families were invited to celebrate diversity by dressing in their traditional clothes, and we saw some stunning costumes from all across the globe including India, Bali, Germany, Ireland, Pakistan, China, Philippines, Morocco and Australia. Local groups and community members were also invited to showcase their talents with dances, songs and music.





WHITE RIBBON MORNING TEA

In November CCK held a morning tea in conjunction with White Ribbon Day, bringing the community together to raise awareness around women's domestic violence. After an Acknowledgement to Country and Maori Karanga, we moved into the visiting space to hear from five guest speakers including Just Kids Health, KEYS, City of Cockburn, WA Police Force and the Department of Home Affairs.

Following this we held a very emotionally charged on-the-couch session hosted by MC Amanda Viviers where four ladies who have lived experience of family domestic violence bravely shared their experiences and what helped them through this journey.
